On Sunday, I received the following e-mail from a reader:

"Just wanted to let you know I passed the General exam using your study guide. It was very helpful. I am now generally ignorant whereas before I was only technically ignorant. Ha!"

My reply to him was:

"Well, if you're generally ignorant, I guess that makes me EXTRA ignorant!"

This isn't just a joke--being ignorant is part of the hobby. Amateur radio operators will always be ignorant about something or other. Even if you could master every facet of the hobby at some point in time, your mastery would be short-lived as the technology continued to advance.

Over the course of my amateur radio career, we've gone from equipment that primarily used vacuum tubes, to solid-state gear that first used discrete transistors and then integrated circuits, to software-defined radios. FCC Invites Comments on Petition to Eliminate 15 dB Gain Limit on Amateur Amplifiers

The FCC has put on public notice and invited comments on a Petition for Rule Making (RM-11767), filed on behalf of an amateur amplifier distributor, which seeks to revise the Amateur Service rules regarding maximum permissible amplifier gain. Expert Linears America LLC of Magnolia, Texas, which distributes linears manufactured by SPE in Italy, wants the FCC to eliminate the 15 dB gain limitation on amateur amplifiers, spelled out in Part 97.317(a)(2). Expert asserts that there should be no gain limitation at all on amplifiers sold or used in the Amateur Service.

"There is no technical or regulatory reason [that] an amplifier capable of being driven to full legal output by even a fraction of a watt should not be available to Amateur Radio operators in the United States," Expert said in its Petition.

Expert maintains that the 15 dB gain limitation is an unneeded holdover from the days when amplifiers were less efficient and the FCC was attempting to rein in the use of Amateur Service amplifiers by Citizens Band operators. While the FCC proposed in its 2004 Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Order in WT Docket 04-140 to delete the requirement that amplifiers be designed to use a minimum of 50 W of drive power and subsequently did so, it did not further discuss the 15 dB amplification limit in the subsequent Report and Order in the docket.

"Although no party advocated retention of the 15 dB limit, it remains in place today," Expert pointed out in its filing. "In the intervening years, advancements in Amateur Radio transmitter technology have led to the availability of highly compact, sophisticated low-power transmitters that require more than 15 dB of amplification to achieve maximum legal power output. Therefore, Expert seeks to remove the 15 dB limit from Part 97.317 so that Amateur Radio manufacturers and distributors will not be forced to needlessly cripple their amplifiers for sale in the United States."

Expert pointed to its Model 1.3K FA amplifier as an example of a linear "inherently capable of considerably more than 15 dB of amplification," which would make it a suitable match for low-power transceivers now on the market having output power on the order of 10 W. - ARRL

RFinder - The World Wide Repeater Directory now has Jamming Reports!

In cooperation with ARRL by request of Mike Lisenco N2YBB, ARRL Hudson Division Director, RFinder now includes the ability to make jamming reports. This is already available in RFinder Android and should be available on iOS devices by Dayton. This ability is available worldwide. Those without a device or subscription can make reports at http://jamming.rfinder.net. The trial version on Android allows jamming reports to be submitted.

Those responsible for coordinating anti-jamming activities can request access at <u>http://jamcoordinator.rfinder.net</u>. to view jamming reports for your area.

"Repeater jamming is a problem worldwide...we've created a way of organizing anti-jamming activities worldwide," says Bob Greenberg, W2CYK, creator of RFinder. "We are evaluating some automated monitoring technology to integrate in the near future...This new feature just extends RFinder's social features even further."

"We came to the RFinder team with this idea and they had it in place within 2 weeks, " says Mike Lysenco N2YBB, ARRL Director for the Hudson Division, "

RFinder is a great tool to have in the fight against malicious interference on our repeaters..."

RFinder is the World Wide Repeater Directory and includes over 60,000 repeaters worldwide in over 170 countries. RFinder is integrated directly with EchoLink on both Android and iPhone and provides the ability to share repeater checkins on Facebook, Twitter and APRS. RFinder is integrated with RT Systems and CHIRP radio programmers and has a routing feature at http://routes.rfinder.net where you can find repeaters over a route worldwide. - Introductions: A brief round of introductions was made. Guests included, Vern Potter, W6NCT, Peter Leonhardt, AE6PL, Liz Leonhardt, K6LIZ, Stewart Stone, KG6BOV, Chuck Dixon, WA6FGK, David Lang, AG6AH, and Joyce Grace, KI6HUV.

<u>Announcements</u>: Vern Potter, W6NCT, spoke about plans for the VCARS-Simi Settlers Field Day at the Reagan Presidential Library. It will be June 25-26, with setup on Friday June 24. Vern had a sign-up sheet for those who are interested in participating. Frank mentioned that we are planning our Spring Picnic at the Rancho Madera Park. Frank asked for member preferences between dates of May 14 and 21 that have been proposed. The date of Saturday May 21 was selected.
 Chuck Dixon, WA6FGK, spoke about the Rabbit Radio Network and invited Simi Settlers members to attend an Open House on Saturday, June 4 from 1 to 3pm at the Chatsworth Peak repeater site.
 Frank introduced Joyce Grace, KI6HUV, who spoke to the Club about Peter Grace, Al6PG, who has been diagnosed with a form of dementia and has been on medications.

- Frank introduced our quest speaker for this month, Stewart Stone, KG6BOV, who gave a Program: presentation on "Red Cross Communications". Stewart is the Emergency Coordinator for Ventura County ARES/ACS Area 4 (Oxnard, Port Hueneme, Point Mugu, and he is the Response Technology Lead for the American Red Cross of Ventura County. Stewart began by describing the recent reorganization of Red Cross regions among counties in California. The "Central California" region now includes down to Ventura County. He said that the Santa Barbara, Oiai and Ventura/Camarillo Red Cross chapters all have close relationships with local radio clubs. Stewart showed pictures of the equipment and antennas set up at the Camarillo office. There is a national VHF coordinating frequency 47.420MHz. He described attempts to establish a region wide radio net on low VHF, ham repeaters or on 20M/40M HF. Stewart spoke about Red Cross activities in Katrina and other hurricanes. There has been cooperation between the US and Cuba and a Hurricane Watch network is set up when needed. At the conclusion of the program Frank thanked Stewart and presented him with a certificate of appreciation from the Simi Settlers.
- <u>Break</u>: Following the program a 25-minute break was taken with refreshments provided by Bill Everett, KI6KSV.
- <u>Member Drawing</u>: The winning name in the progressive Membership drawing was Club Treasurer, Glenn Daly, WA6GNB, who was present to win the \$60 prize. Therefore, the amount will start over with \$10 for our next regular meeting on May 12, 2016. Members must be present to win, and the prize grows by \$10 each month it is unclaimed.
